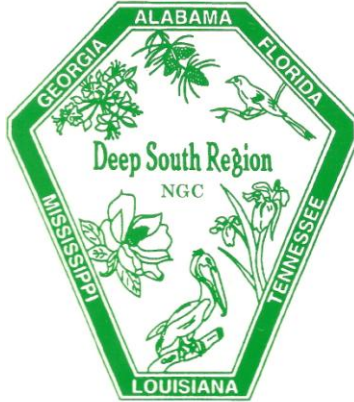

STANDARD FLOWER SHOW GENERAL RULES

1. This Show will comply in every respect with the requirements and objectives for a Standard Flower Show as established by National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC). *The Handbook for Flower Shows, 2007 Edition*, with any corrections, shall be used as the authority.
2. The NGC Standard System of Awarding will be used (HB page 5). Top Exhibitor Awards listed may be offered and awarded if merited. Awards may be withheld if not merited. Decisions of the Judges are final.
3. The overall emphasis in this show will be on fresh plant material. No artificial plant material will be permitted in any Division. Exhibitors must keep entries fresh for the duration of the show, replacing spent flowers.
4. Competition in the Horticulture Division is open to members of NGC and affiliated societies. Advance registration for oversized containers, hanging baskets, Collections or Display entries **must be made** with the Horticulture Entries Chairman, Tina Tuttle: (850) 587-2361 or TTuttle1954@gmail.com.
5. Competition in the Design Division is open to amateur designers who are members of NGC. All entries are to be the work of ONE exhibitor. Designers may enter ONLY in their State's Section. Advance registration for Design entries **must be made** with the Design Entries Chairman, Gina Jogan: (850) 587-2621 or gvjogan@panhandle.rr.com.
6. All horticulture exhibits **must be approved** by the Classification Committee. This committee may disqualify any entry not conforming to the schedule, or which cannot be made to conform, or any entry that is of inferior quality. **Committee will initial entries.**
7. All design entries **must be approved** by the Design Consultant before designer leaves exhibit area. Entry cards **must be initialed** by consultant.
8. Native Plants and those on their state conservation lists may be used by exhibitors, provided such plants are named and have been grown by exhibitor or obtained in a legal manner.
9. Judging will take place between 1 pm and 3 pm Monday, March 14, 2011. Only Judges, Clerks, Classification Chairman, Horticulture consultant, Design consultant, Flower Show Chairman and co-chairman may remain on the floor during judging. Awards Chairman and Tabulation Committee may be present to receive Clerks' sheets and begin tabulation as soon as possible.
10. Care will be taken to safeguard exhibits. Properties should be marked with exhibitor's name. Neither Deep South Region nor Hilton Lafayette assumes liability for damage, loss or personal injury.
11. Horticulture specimens and all designs **must be** entered between 8 am-11 am on Monday, March 14, 2011. Designs **must be** brought FINISHED and READY to place.

12. All exhibits and displays **must be removed** between 2:30 pm and 3:30 pm on Tuesday, March 15, 2011. There will be no early removal of exhibits.
13. The show will be open to the public following the ribbon cutting ceremony on Monday, March 14, 2011 at 3:00 pm and remain open until 6:30 pm. The show will be open Tuesday, March 15, 2011 from 9:00 am-2:30 pm.

DIVISION I - HORTICULTURE RULES AND REQUIREMENTS

1. All horticulture specimens must be fresh plant material, grown by the exhibitor for at least 90 days (exception: annuals). Combination plantings must have been in the exhibitor's possession and growing together for at least 6 weeks.
2. All plant material will be miniature, dwarf or of naturally small growth.
3. Exhibitor is to provide an appropriate container (clear, colorless glass bottles preferred) for each cut specimen entered. Bottles will be discarded if not picked up when show closes. Exhibitor is to provide wedging (plastic packing "peanuts" or a plastic wrap product preferred). Anchoring of the container is permitted if unobtrusive.
4. Triplicate entry cards will be available upon request or at the show. Entry tags will be filled out in pencil. (Contact Tina Tuttle: ttuttle1954@gmail.com.)
5. All specimens must be named: Genus and species; variety and cultivar added when available. Common names may be added. Classification Committee will assist exhibitors in naming entries.
6. The *Southern Living Garden Book* (2004) will be used as reference.
7. Exhibitor may make more than one entry per class or subclass if each entry is a different genus, species, cultivar, variety, type, size, or color.
8. Classification Committee reserves the right to refuse substandard material. Oiling or dressing of foliage on cut specimens is not allowed. Double potting is not allowed.
9. Arboreal specimens: Since this is a Petite Advanced-Standard Flower Show, specimens should be sufficient in length to show habit of growth (at least 2 nodes).
10. Cut flowers or cut decorative foliage should be one stem unless otherwise indicated in the schedule.
11. The Classification/Entries Chairmen and committee may subdivide as deemed necessary by cultivar, type, color, name, etc. The Judges do not subdivide.
12. Hydroponically grown exhibits will NOT be allowed.
13. One plant per container unless naturally grown with multiple stems. (Exception: hanging baskets, combination planters.)
14. No containers over 10 pounds; no specimen over 2 feet in height or width.

- Flowering specimens and colorful bracts, cut or container-grown, single specimen or collection. (*Handbook*, page 298)
- Foliage Specimens, cut or container-grown, single specimen or collection (*Handbook*, page 299)
- Arboreal: Foliage or flowering, fruited, coned, cut specimens only (*Handbook*, page 300)
- Combination Plantings: may be flowering or foliage (*Handbook*, page 301)
- Displays: may be cut or container-grown plants (*Handbook*, page 302)
- Fruits, vegetables, and nuts (TNG summer 2010)
- Collection of Fruits, vegetables and nuts (TNG summer 2010)

1. All classes are open to amateur gardeners who are members of National Garden Clubs, Inc. Designers may enter designs ONLY in their State's section of Design.
2. Advance reservations must be made for all designs to GVJogan@Panhandle.RR.com. If the registered exhibitor is unable to fill the exhibit, it is the exhibitor's responsibility to provide a substitute.
3. Designs must be entered between 8am and 10am on Monday March 14, 2011. Designs may not be made in the showroom. Please bring completed designs, ready to place, to Ashland Room.
4. Designs must be the work of one person, placed by designer or someone the designer names to place the design.
5. All designs must contain some plant material. Use of fresh plant material is encouraged.
6. Plant material must be neatly and correctly listed on **unlined** side of a 3"x 5" card, furnished by committee. Judges will write comments on lined side of card.
7. Design classes are limited to four entries each. An exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired, but may enter only one exhibit per class. (Also see Rule #1)
8. No cut fruit or vegetables may be used. No artificial flowers, fruit, or foliage is permitted. Coloring of fresh plant material is not allowed.
9. Exhibitors are expected to follow National Garden Club policies as stated in the 2007 *Handbook for Flower Shows*, and any corrections.
10. Design staging provided by the Flower Show committee may not be removed from show room or altered in any way. Nothing may be adhered to staging.
11. Designs may be moved for the purposes of photography, if necessary.
